

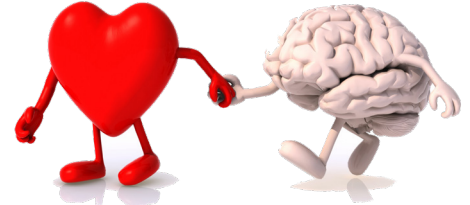
My Sharing Skills Activity Guide Grade K-2



Know Your *Neuro*

Quiz Questions

1. What are sharing skills? **Answer:** Sharing is letting other people use your things and taking turns.
2. According to the video, what is the first sharing skill? **Answer:** To take turns.
3. What is the definition of taking turns? **Answer:** Letting friends or classmates do something while you wait for your turn.
4. When can you practice taking turns? **Answer:** When speaking, playing, or being a leader.
5. Is waiting to take your turn hard or easy? **Answer:** Sometimes it can be hard.
6. According to the video, what is the second sharing skill? **Answer:** Be patient.
7. What is being patient? **Answer:** Being patient is waiting your turn with a positive attitude, without getting upset. That takes self-control!
8. According to the video, what is the third sharing skill? **Answer:** Be generous.
9. What does generous mean? **Answer:** Being willing to share a lot and often.
10. How could you be generous? **Answer:** Share your toys, computer tablet, books, or your playtime with others.



Classroom Activities

Share a Smile

Ask students to sit in a circle and ask for a volunteer to start the sharing exercise. Instruct the volunteer to look at their neighbor with good eye contact and a big smile. Then, the neighbor will pass the smile to their neighbor with same good eye contact and big smile.

Positive Patience Award

Ask students to draw and color a variety of 'Positive Patience' awards. Every day, challenge students to be positively patient while waiting for others to finish speaking, not interrupting, and waiting in line. Once a week, ask students who should receive the award for being the most positively patient person, and give them one of the awards.

1. You ask to share a toy with a friend and they say 'no'.
2. You are waiting in line and someone keeps pushing you from behind because they are being impatient.
3. You need to share a book with your classmate, but they are taking a long time.
4. You are generous and share your favorite chips with a friend.



Show and Tell Sharing

Divide students into pairs. Ask each pair to draw a picture together by taking turns getting the supplies, deciding what to draw, and doing the actual drawing. Then, ask the pairs to show the class what they drew together and answer these questions:

1. How did we share when creating this picture?
2. What was easy, and what was hard about sharing this drawing?
